## **FOOTNOTES**

- 1. Use footnotes (placed at the bottom [foot] of the page), and not endnotes (which go at the *end* of the paper). These footnotes are only placed on this bibliography page to save paper. Your bibliography page should <u>not</u> have footnotes on it.
- 2. Footnotes should be indented<sup>1</sup> and double-spaced from each other.
- 3. When you quote an author a second time, you *only* need to identify his last name and the page number.<sup>2</sup> However, if you use two works by the same author, the second time you refer to a work you must *also* include the title of the book along with the author's last name and page number.<sup>3</sup>
- 4. If you have questions about other footnote formats (magazines, encyclopedias, reference works), please consult a grammar book<sup>4</sup> from the library or from one of the faculty members.
