IV. John

- A. The Authorship of John
 - 1. External Evidence
- a. Early fathers such as Irenaeus Tertullian, and Origin ascribed the Gospel to John.
 - b. A consistent Christian history accepted Johannine authorship.
 - 2. Internal Evidence
 - a. Baptist tradition has accepted Johannine authorship because writer was a Jew and an eyewitness to the Lord.
 - b. He called himself the disciple "whom Jesus loved."
 - B. The Date of John
 - 1. Probably sufficient time had gone by after AD 70, since John did not refer to the major event in Jewish history.
 - 2. Manuscript P52 is a fragment of John's Gospel and is dated AD 125; John probably wrote his Gospel with the Epistles and the ἀποκάλυψις toward the end of the 1st century (AD 95-98).
 - C. The Origin and Destination of John: he probably wrote to churches perhaps in Ephesus or elsewhere in Asia Minor.
 - D. The Purpose of John: to evangelize by showing that Christ is the Son of God, and that by putting faith in His is requisite for eternal life (Jn. 20:31).
 - E. The characteristics of John
 - 1. John recorded seven sign miracles (σημεῖον [17x in John]).
 - a. Jn. 2:11
 - b. Jn. 4:54; et al.
 - 2. John recorded many of Christ's ἐγώ εἰμι (יהֹוה) sayings:
 - a. I am the bread of life (Jn. 6:35, 48).
 - b. I am the light of the world (Jn. 8:12).
 - c. I am he (Jn. 8:24).
 - d. I am the door of the sheep (Jn. 10:7).
 - e. I am the good shepherd (Jn. 10:11, 14).
 - f. I am the resurrection and the life (Jn. 11:25).
 - g. I am the way, the truth, and the life (Jn. 14:6).
 - h. I am the true vine (Jn. 15:1).
 - i. I am (Jn. 18:5, 6, 8)
 - 3. John repudiated Gnosticism with clear statements on Christ as the God-Man.
 - a. Jn. 1:1-18.
 - b. Jn. 3:13.

c. Jn. 5:4.d. Jn. 6:69e. Jn. 14:17 (cf. P66).

- 4. John focused on the Lord's first week and last week of ministry.
- 5. He included the famous *ecce homo* (Latin translation) expression, "behold the man" (Jn. 19:5).
 - 6. He recorded the prediction of Peter's death and possibility that John may escape death (Jn. 21:18-23).
