
BBC UPDATE

Textual Variants in I and II Timothy

Part 2 of 2 Part Article

II Timothy

II Tim. 1:11

ritical text advocates always attempt to perpetuate the shorter reading according to their pre-conceived dictates. In spite of "the overwhelming mass of witnesses" supporting the TR reading of διδάσκαλος $\hat{\epsilon}\theta\nu\hat{\omega}\nu$ ("a teacher of the Gentiles"),¹ the Committee opted for the omission of $\hat{\epsilon}\theta\nu\hat{\omega}\nu$. Again, the Committee determined that "there being no good reason to account for its omission if it were original here."² Of course, Peter declared that heretics tampered with Scripture shortly after it was written (II Pet. 3:15-16).

II Tim. 2:3

he Critical text followed the early corruption of words and exchanged the biblical reading σὺ οὖν κακοπάθησον ("*thou therefore endure hardness*") for Συγκακοπάθησον ("suffer hardship with me," *ASV*). The Committee assumed that the scribe's eye followed the construction of v. 1. Again, the TR has majority support, but of course the CT advocates reject this testimony.

II Tim. 2:14

aul desired that the Lord would give Timothy understanding about important truths to pass on to faithful men needed to be charged "before the Lord" ($\epsilon \nu \omega \pi \iota \rho \nu \tau \sigma \tilde{\nu}$ Kupío $\tilde{\nu}$), the Apostle exhorted. However, the NAS followed the CT (with its "C" rating) and changed the verse to read "in the presence of God" ($\epsilon \nu \omega \pi \iota \rho \nu \tau \sigma \tilde{\nu}$ $\theta \epsilon \sigma \tilde{\nu}$). Metzger admits that both readings have comparable weighty evidence but the Committee decided on the "easier" reading of the CT, since Paul did indeed employ the expression five other times in the Pastorals (I Tim. 2:3; 5:4, 21; 6:13; and II Tim. 4:1). However, the TR reading occurs only here in the Pauline *corpus*,³ making it the rare and "harder" reading. Of course, so-called "earlier" and "harder" readings are not biblical criteria for determining the text of Scripture (cf. II Pet. 1:21). Nevertheless, this example demonstrates the Committee's adverse animosity toward and relentless rejection of the received Bible text of the Lord.

II Tim. 2:18

rticles are inspired and important in the NT Greek text. This verse offers an example of this affirmation. The TR reads $\tau \eta \nu$ $\dot{\alpha} \nu \dot{\alpha} \sigma \tau \alpha \sigma \iota \nu$ (*"the resurrection"*), whereas the CT omitted the Greek article or put brackets around it (e.g., $[\tau \eta \nu]$ $\dot{\alpha} \nu \dot{\alpha} \sigma \tau \alpha \sigma \iota \nu$), questioning its authoritative validity. Although most modern versions rightly translate the Greek as "the resurrection," the CT questioned the text about the resurrection which very text warned of deviation from the doctrine of the resurrection. The anarthrous expression of the resurrection may have been part of the attack upon the doctrine—e.g., "some sort of non-descript rising." The Committee recognized that the TR reading received "nearly overwhelming textual support," but since \aleph omitted the article, they were compelled to put brackets around $\tau \eta \nu$. They gave their decision a "C" rating!⁴

II Tim. 4:22

he full title of the precious Saviour is omitted in the CT. The TR preserved the reading as "*The Lord Jesus Christ*" (Ὁ Κύριος Ἰησοῦς Χριστὸς), whereas the CT read "The Lord" (Ὁ Κύριος). The Committee makes the inane argument, saying,


In the expectation that a letter as late as 2 Timothy would have the fullest formulation, one would be tempted to explain the shorter readings as due to accidental omissions. Such omissions of the sacred name(s), however, are rare, [*sic*] and it is far more probable that the original reading is that preserved by the joint testimony of Alexandrian...and Western... witnesses...⁵

Also, the concluding "*amen*" ($\dot{\alpha}\mu\dot{\eta}\nu$) disappeared in the CT, allegedly because its inclusion would be an obvious liturgical necessity. Instead, Paul ascertained the verity of his inspired letter with the biblical affirmation, as recorded by the TR— $\dot{\alpha}\mu\dot{\eta}\nu$.

CONCLUSION

he CT has reduced the TR by about seven percent of the words, and changed wording and obviously theology. Nevertheless, the TR is the Greek text predicted by the Lord Jesus Christ and preserved through Christian history. It should be received today by His assemblies as the preserved, inspired words of Scripture.

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Sophia Gagnon sang a beautiful arrangement of "It Is Well" with sister Amanda accompanying on the piano.

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
