# **Bible Study**

#### Songs We Ought Not Sing

#### Introduction

A liberal theologian once said something like "I can sing orthodoxy, I just can't teach it." What believers sing ought to be in harmony with what they believe and teach. Paul said, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord" (Col. 3:16). The music and the words sung in NT churches ought to teach and admonish church members. Several songs appear in hymnals used by independent Baptist churches which should be scrutinized for orthodoxy and appropriateness for use in the Lord's assemblies of the truth. Independent Baptist believers ought not to sing some of these hymns and songs.

#### **Songs with Doctrinal Problems**

For instance, the song "Nearer, My God, to Thee" was written by the Unitarian Sarah F. Adams (1805-1848) for Unitarians. It says nothing about the Lord Jesus Christ and certainly nothing about His deity, which truth Unitarians reject. There is a vague reference to "a cross that raiseth me" in the first stanza, but the God to whom Adams wanted proximity is not the God of the Bible. Another author, this time the ex-Anglican-turned-Roman Catholic Frederick W. Faber (1814-1863) wrote several popular hymns such as "I Worship Thee," "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy," and "Faith of our Fathers." The latter hymn is very popular (especially on Father's Day), yet when Faber wrote this he was at the height of his pilgrimage toward Marian theology, and he ultimately wrote "True Devotion to Mary." The persecuted and martyred fathers about whom he wrote were Roman Catholic heretics. Their faith was in a "christ" who needed Mary's help (cf. Heb. 1:3), and hence their "faith" was not Scriptural faith in the biblical Person. Another Roman Catholic writer was St. Francis of Assisi (1182-1226), the nature mystic and staunch persecutor of

the Anabaptists, who wrote "All Creatures of Our God and King." His words must be interpreted in light of his heretical views on God, creation, and biblical truth. Another Romish monk, Bernard of Clairvaux (1091-1153), wrote "Jesus, the Very Thought of Thee." Although the words and tune are very touching and tender, 'St. Bernard' did not know the Christ of the Bible, as he lived his life entrenched in Roman Catholicism. A final song for consideration is "Work For the Night is Coming" by Annie Coghill (1836-1907). The appropriateness of employing this song is severely questioned in light of the fact that it does not say one thing about the person and work of the Lord Jesus Christ. There is nothing in it to identify the song with Christianity. It seems to extol man's work with the refrain "When man's work is done... is over." This could be a song sung by atheists or communists with no change of words. It hardly gives praise to the Lord Jesus Christ.

#### Conclusion

Much is said about the dangers of Contemporary Christian Music, drums, rock beat, etc. entering into independent Baptist churches. But there must be a warning about the composers' doctrine and words as well. For instance, no one should attempt to attribute the Beatles'"My Sweet Lord" to the Lord Jesus Christ, since it was their effort to mock Christianity and promote the Hindu deity Krishna. There is still a need for more scrutiny in examining Christian music to help independent Baptist churches honor the Saviour. There are some songs in Christian hymnals which we ought not sing.

## **BBTS Online**

BBTS is attempting to open opportunities for seminarians interested in studying the Bible and Theology and receiving seminary degrees. #### Contentment

"Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee"

#### Hebrews 13:5



Today, the goal of many people is the accumulation of property, it is refreshing to remember what God tells his children about being content *"with such things as ye have."* This is hard for men to do. It goes against his very nature of want. However, God makes it


clear that we are to live *"without covetousness."* This means "without ill gain of property" or "love for gain of property. Our life is not to major on, or to seek immorally or with wrong motive gain of property.

From our text we learn that God wants us to be living content. This contentment is rooted in Christ's ever presence with us, rather than in the temporal nature of things. This *"so that we may boldly say, The Lord is my helper"* (Hebrews 13:6). Now that we are saved, our confidence is in Christ. Therefore, as Christians, we should find our contentment in our Savior Jesus Christ.

To young Timothy, Paul wrote, "But godliness with contentment is great gain" (1 Timothy 6:6). The emphasis is on godliness; having an attitude and action which speaks of personal holiness and piety toward God. When our godliness is accompanied with being content. God calls that a "great gain," the Greek word means, an "exceedingly big acquisition."

If we have "food and raiment," we are told to be content. (1 Timothy 6:8). The reason given: "we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out" (1 Timothy 6:7). Our God has promised to take care of our needs (Matthew 6:33). Putting the Lord first is godliness and brings satisfaction or contentment to our lives, which is "great gain." -CAR
